

 - b. Choose two selections that best demonstrate your flute abilities
 - c. Must be contrasting fast/technical versus slow/lyrical
 - d. The selections should be no longer than 3 minutes each
- 4. Brief sight-reading

Auditions are not competitive. All auditioning flutists are accepted members. These auditions are for placement/programming purposes and individual goal-setting.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: Alaina Clarice

2016 FSSL College Young Artist Competition 2nd Prize Winner

-Why did you choose to play the flute?

When I was seven years old, I saw a commercial on TV of a woman playing a flute with a bird perched on the end. I was fascinated by the imagery, and believe that is when my initial attraction to the flute began.

-When did you begin playing the flute?

I began playing the flute when I was nine years old.

-Do you have any musical highlights you would like to share and/or what is your most notable or personally satisfying accomplishment?

The past year has been the most fulfilling time in my musical and personal life thus far. It was my senior year of college and I made the decision to apply for graduate school. This required preparing and recording pre-screening materials while still keeping up with my academics. I am naturally a perfectionist, so the high standards I had set for myself led to a great deal of stress and anxiety.

At the same time, I was also preparing for SIUe's annual concerto competition. Because I was so focused on my recordings, I didn't place as much pressure on myself regarding the competition. Without the familiar feeling of self-imposed stress, I had not expected to do well. I was very surprised when I found out I was one of the winners. The exciting outcome helped me realize any extra, unnecessary pressure may be a hindrance to my goals.

This mentality helped me through my five graduate school auditions during which the rental vehicle failed to start at one school, my shoes were stolen at another, and my luggage was lost on a flight. Though these were stressful circumstances, I was able to focus on each audition, trusting in my preparation, and believing I would end up where I was supposed to be. Overall, I was pleased with each audition and delighted to receive significant offers from multiple schools.

-What is your favorite style of music to listen to? To perform?

In addition to classical music, I enjoy listening to Indie bands and World music, especially traditional Balkan and Georgian folk music. My favorite style to perform is 20th century because of the wide variety within that time period. Regardless of era, I am drawn to darker, heavier music, and pieces with a lot of intensity.



MEMBER SPOTLIGHT Alaina Clarice

-Do you have a favorite practice routine? Can you describe it?

Because I am a student, I have a lot of time to practice throughout the day. I devote about two hours or more to fundamentals and another 1-2 hours on etudes/repertoire. The first hour of my routine is spent with long tones and vibrato exercises. Then, I move on to harmonics, interval studies, and some additional tone exercises out of Trevor Wye's Complete Daily Exercises book, or I may play some slow folk /pop tunes that I enjoy. Next, I work on technique. These exercises vary from week to week, but there are several that I do often. I like T&G #1 and #2, as they are very easy to memorize- this allows me to focus on watching my body/hand position in the mirror while still paying attention to the quality of my articulation. I also like T&G #4 because it goes through major and minor scales, and I practice these as written, with various articulations, two notes per written for working on double tonguing and three per written for triple tonguing. As for my favorite technical exercise, I really enjoy working on chromatic scales- I start on low C and play up until the next octave C (or the one above) and come back down, then do the same starting on C#, then D, etc.- I continue this pattern up chromatically, getting it as fast and even as I can. I like to split my routine into several sessions, but it depends on my schedule for the day. It is usually two sessions, the first being fundamentals and the second one focusing on etudes, repertoire, and ensemble music. I understand this may not be realistic for non- students, so it is something I am taking advantage of while I can.

-Describe any other hobbies you have.

I am definitely considered by many to have a unique set of hobbies and interests. Beyond my enjoyment of walks, video games, and cats, I am fascinated by dreams. I love researching dream interpretation and the ability to stay aware during dreamtime. I also really like watching medical documentaries or anything that has to do with anomalies of the human body. However, one of my greatest areas of interest is that of unexplained phenomenon and the things in life we cannot see.

-Describe your musical background.

When I entered the fourth grade, I had the opportunity to join the school band. Despite having a lot of trouble making a sound, I decided to choose the flute even though the trombone was recommended. I began taking private lessons the following summer with Kristi Hammiel, who definitely strengthened my love of the flute. I continued studying with her throughout high school, where I was a member of the Belleville East Marching Lancers and Wind Ensemble. I also participated in the Belleville Philharmonic Youth Orchestra and the IMEA All-District and All-State Honor bands.

Although I entered college with the intention of studying medicine, I decided to pursue music. I graduated in May from Southern Illinois University Edwardsville with a degree in Flute Performance and a minor in Anthropology. I studied with Dr. Shelly Monier and was a member of the SIUe Flute Choir, Wind Symphony, Orchestra, and World Music Ensemble. This fall I will be starting a Master's degree in Flute Performance at Bowling Green State University where I will be studying with Dr. Conor Nelson and serving as his Teaching Assistant.

-Do you have any advice for aspiring flutists?

My biggest piece of advice is to remember that fundamentals are extremely important, as these skills will be apparent in any piece of music you perform. Also, you should take time to listen to flutists and other musicians to help discover the qualities you may want to add to your playing. Finally, just like everyone has their own life experiences, each individual has an aspect of their playing that is unique, so absorb as much as possible from those around you.

Students: you're just about to begin your senior year of high school, and the decision of attending college looms ahead of you. Choosing a college takes a great deal of preparation and research, so the earlier you can start, the better.

Teachers: your students are in their final year of high school and eventually will leave the nest...and as if you don't know already, your help and support in their preparation is crucial to their success. Your involvement in the process goes beyond their weekly lessons.

This article will discuss the details of the college selection process, and I aim to give you all some tips on how to make it more organized and easier as time goes on.

What's Your Major?

Are you going for music performance? Music education? Music business? Music therapy? A general Bachelor of Arts? Music minor? These are all important questions to ask yourself when considering a career in music. Ask your teacher or band director about these options; they will have some insight on the academic course load any given music major requires. The table below details a few of the possible career paths you can take with these given degrees:

Teachers, don't be afraid to be 100% honest with your students about the hard work that goes into a music degree. The cause is great, but if you know one of your students is not cut out for pursuing a music degree, you owe it to them to say something. Even if you feel they need to "learn it on their own", the money they or their parents will waste on the audition and application fees could go toward another institution. Even worse, I've seen many students try to push their way through music school because their high school teacher told them they could, only to find the realization that a music degree isn't what they thought it would be and they lose interest in a music career.

Where to Apply?

Applications open in September, and the early application deadlines usually fall on November 1, so it's best to narrow down your choices starting now. Think about where you'd like to live for the next 4 years; do you want to stay close to home or would you like to branch out elsewhere? More often than not, it is much more financially responsible to attend a smaller college, or even take the required general education courses at a community college. There are plenty of professional flutists who lead fulfilling careers without a degree from a "big name" institution. I have included three separate charts with only a few universities that I can recommend; there are so many out there to apply to and I cannot stress enough that you can learn ANYWHERE if you want to.

Teachers, try not to let your influences steer your students away from certain schools. You may have had an unpleasant experience with one teacher, but that doesn't necessarily mean your student will as well. Be completely honest with your students, and if they decide to go through with applying to a school you don't like, just be as supportive as possible.

What to Play?

Each institution you choose will have different audition requirements. Generally, the more prestigious schools will require prescreening recordings, which serve as "round 1" of the audition process. You will be told after the prescreening deadline if you will be invited to campus for a live, final audition.

Whether any given college has a prescreening round or not, it is best to pick repertoire that not only fits within the college's guidelines, but pieces that showcase your strengths as a player. Your teacher will be able to help you choose suitable repertoire. Most schools will expect you to know all 12 major scales in 2 octaves, your chromatic scale in 3 octaves (all memorized) and two contrasting solo works. Below is a chart that lists suitable repertoire for intermediate and advanced levels, over different musical periods:

Some Final Tips

Here is a list of some final tips that will help make your audition days a success:

- Perform, Perform! There is nothing that will help you play your best on audition day
 more than performing your pieces as much as you can. Nursing homes, church services, and
 master classes near your area are great venues. If you are having trouble finding venues for
 performance, get your family together and give an impromptu performance in your living room.
 You can even set up your smartphone in your practice room and video record a "mock audition".
- Contact the flute professors at your chosen schools. If you (and the professor) have the time, schedule a lesson before you audition so you can get a sense of how they teach. You may decide you no longer want to audition for that school, but if you like the professor, it might help you feel a little more comfortable on audition day.
- **Develop a good warm-up routine.** This does not just apply to warming up on your flute; make sure you are as relaxed as you can be on audition day. Slow stretches and deep breathing exercises will help to calm your nerves.
- **Make recordings.** Take the time in your practice sessions to set up a camera or microphone and record yourself playing excerpts or the full pieces. Listen back to these recordings and bring them to your lessons to discuss what you can improve upon with your teacher.
- **Take care of yourself.** Leading up to your audition, make sure you are eating healthy foods and getting plenty of sleep. Your body needs to be in optimal condition, because auditions are stressful!


